Money in our Pockets

August savings excluding glass and aluminum cans [none transported to vendor] were (\$197). This puts our total year to date savings for the year at just over \$650. Our outlook for the remainder or 2017 has not changed; we expect that we'll see some fluctuation from month to month depending on prices fetched for aluminum, copper, and scrap metal; however, we're not looking for any major changes before the end of the year. We are continuing to keep a close eye on the market for glass. As more uses for recycled glass are developed, the demand should increase, and the price paid by the vendors for glass should also increase. The recycling market will rebound, but until it does, we need to be mindful of the important role each of us plays in protecting our environment and preserving our precious non-renewable resources. Your continued enthusiasm and support of your recycling program is greatly appreciated – recycling does have a positive impact and benefits all of us.

Everyone Does Make a Difference

I'm always interested in companies' innovative efforts to curb pollution and protect our resources through new products generated from recycled materials. Discarded plastics that eventually end up polluting our oceans pose a tremendous threat to our aquatic wildlife and the purity of our oceans. It was recently reported by the MacAuthur Foundation that there will be more plastic [by weight] than fish in our oceans by 2050. Here are five companies that have broken through with new products in 2016 that will help to slow the plastic pollution of our oceans:

- Adidas will start showcasing sleek, ocean-friendly designs. Last year, Adidas partnered with Parley for the Oceans, an organization that provides a platform for designers, to focus on creating inventive, sustainable new products. The Adidas x Parley, which hits the market later this year, will be made from recycled plastic recovered from the ocean that is run through a 3-D printer to create a stylish running shoes.
- Saltwater Brewery located in Florida created an Edible Six Pack Ring, a potential replacement for its plastic cousin. These digestible rings are made from barley and other natural materials, so they are biodegradable and sea life can safely eat them.
- Pharrell Williams, the singer turned fashion designer, newly released clothing line, RAW for the Oceans, is helping turn ocean plastic into wearable fashion. The line is part of his larger G-Star RAW clothing collection, which is made using a four-step process that takes plastics found along shorelines worldwide and breaks them down into a weavable clothing fiber called Bionic Yarn, a product cofounded by Williams. The music star's new ocean-centric line includes trendy jeans, graphic tees and modern kimonos.
- SPARK, an international architectural design firm, hopes to repurpose plastic ocean garbage into brightly colored, solar-powered beach huts along Singapore's East Coast Park. The huts will utilize recycled high-density polyethylene plastic—known for its flexibility—from the South Pacific Garbage Patch [an area in the South Pacific Ocean where plastic waste collects] to create the "scales" that make up each hut's artichoke-shaped outer shell.
- Method, a cleaning-products company, offers a dish and hand soap housed in plastic recovered from our oceans. Method recovers plastic from the ocean and from Hawaii's beaches. The plastic is then recycled to make bottles to hold its various soaps. I should also add that Method's soap products are largely biodegradable and Method uses wind energy to power its factory and production lines.

Tip of the Month

Those of us with glass shower doors know the struggle in keeping them shining. You got 'em because they're clear and pretty and visually spacious; however, a week goes by, and they're splotchy and filmy with soap scum. Saturday morning finds you inhaling fumes trying to clean them. There's a better way; you can use a dryer sheet. You need 1 dryer sheet - that's all. It's alright if it's already been used so don't throw out those used sheets after you remove the clothes from the dryer. Dampen the sheet with water, and lightly wipe your shower door and walls. Dryer sheets contain ingredients that are designed to soften fabrics. Those very same ingredients coincidentally soften soap scum, so it easily lifts right off the glass without hard scrubbing.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector

Who can register to vote?

New Hampshire residents who will be 18 years of age or older on the day of the next election, and a United States citizen. There is no minimum period of time you are required to have lived in the state before being allowed to register. You may register as soon as you move into your new community.

Where and how do I register to vote?

- 1) You may apply to your town or city clerk's office. You will be required to fill out a standard voter registration form. Deadline for registering to vote at the Alexandria Town Clerk's office before the November 8th election is October 27th at 4:00 pm. The Town Clerk's Office is located at 47 Washburn Road, Alexandria.
- 2) You may also register with your community's Supervisors of the Checklist. The Alexandria Supervisors of the Checklist will be meeting on Saturday, October 29th from11:00 to 11:30 am at the Old Town Hall, 45 Washburn Road, Alexandria.
- 3) Qualified individuals may register to vote at the polling place on election day at all elections.

No matter when or where you register to vote, you will be required to fill out a standard voter registration form, and you will be asked to show proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile. These qualifications may be established by signing affidavit(s).

Requests for ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Absentee ballots are available from your town or city clerk approximately 30 days prior to an election. Request the absentee ballot application from the clerk; or, if you wish, you may submit a request in writing which should include all the information that is required on the application. Don't forget your name, voting address, mailing address and your signature. An *application* for an absentee ballot may be transmitted by facsimile to a town or city clerk (Alexandria Town Clerk fax#603-744-8577).

Return of ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Clerks may accept completed absentee ballots <u>submitted in person by the voter until 5:00 p.m. the day before an election</u>. A voter's absentee ballot may also be returned in person by the voter's parent, spouse, sibling or child to the town clerk. The person returning the absentee ballot shall complete a form and provide proper ID before the clerk will accept the ballot. Also, absentee ballots will be <u>accepted until 5:00 p.m. on election day if received through the mail and postmarked</u>.

NEVER leave a completed absentee ballot in a box, on a desk, or slipped through the clerk's window or door.

A marked absentee ballot may NOT be transmitted by facsimile to a town or city clerk.
