Money in our Pockets

July savings including glass [\$381] were \$547. This puts our total year to date savings for the year at just over \$850. We expect that we'll see some fluctuation from month to month depending on prices fetched for aluminum, copper, and scrap metal; however, we're not looking for any major changes before the end of the year. We are also keeping a close eye on the market for glass. As more and more uses for recycled glass are developed, the demand should increase and with it, the price paid by the vendors. The recycling market will rebound, but until it does, we need to be mindful of the important role each of us plays in protecting our environment and preserving our precious non-renewable natural resources. Your continued enthusiasm and support of your recycling program is greatly appreciated – recycling does have a positive impact and benefits all of us.

Everyone Does Make a Difference

Unless your compost pile is located in a place where you can control the temperature, you can expect the process to take longer during the colder winter months. Microbes responsible for the breakdown of organic matter can remain active in the compost pile because of the heat generated by the bacteria; however, when the temps cool down, aerobic bacteria become less active, microbial activity slows, and the oxidation process takes longer. Additionally, a compost pile needs the right amount of air and water (in addition to carbon and nitrogen) to be successful, so when that winter snow buries your compost pile, air flow is restricted and moisture content may be excessive; these conditions also affecting the oxidation process.

There are measures you can take to protect your pile from the elements and keep it viable further into the winter months:

- 1. Build a roof.** Control external environmental factors by protecting your compost pile from unwanted precipitation; cover it with a tarp or build a pitched roof.
- 2. Block it in.** Holding units are an alternative to heap piles. Build a protective barrier around your pile. If you already compost in some type of holding unit, make sure that it's covered. Even if you don't have a holding bin, putting a tarp over your compost pile not only protects it from unwanted precipitation, but it also helps contain the internal heat in the pile.
- 3. Make a bigger pile.** If you don't have a holding unit for you compost, enlarge the pile. Because volume is a factor in retaining compost pile heat, the University of Illinois Extension, suggests; "during [the] fall months, making a good sized heap will help the composting process work longer into the winter season."
- 4. Shred it.** According to the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, "Shredding the material in the pile to particles less than two inches in size will allow [the pile] to heat more uniformly and will insulate it from outside temperature extremes."
- 5. Suspend outdoor composting.** You can hold your compost material and create a worm bin to handle your food scraps [excluding dairy products, meat, grease, or animal fat]. A worm bin is an easy solution, doesn't require much space, easy to create, and very efficient. Reuse an old dresser drawer, build a box out of wood or find/buy a plastic bin; the approximate size should be 16" x 24" x 8". For wooden bins, line the bottom and sides with plastic [an old shower curtain or plastic garbage bag works well]. Instead of soil, composting red worms live in moist newspaper bedding. Information for the purchase of red worms and preparation of the bin can be found on the internet or local library.

In the end, it is always important to consider what type of system works best for you. The area available for composting, along with the time commitment you are willing to give, all impact the type of composting system that would work best for you. Always do your research when looking to start, continue, or try a new type of composting system.

CALENDAR PICTURES. Enamel shabby wastebaskets and paste on calendar pictures for new decor. (Scenic ads and posters can also be used.) Shellac over the pictures for longer wearing and washability.

IRONING BOARDS. Strip it of padding and paint or enamel it. Then decorate it with stencils or with Swedish or Pennsylvania-Dutch folk designs and use it for a snack table; or lower it for a typewriter or sewing table. Covered with a removable sheet of plywood, and it can serve as a cutting or paste-up table for sewing or wallpaper.

RUBBER SCRAPS. Old hot-water bottles, inner tubes, worn out waders or rubber boots, etc. can be reused by cutting up and sewing pieces under corners of throw rugs to anchor them. Strips can be attached to overalls or jeans as kneeling pads for gardeners. Use a strip over the edge of a porcelain kitchen table to protect the tabletop when using a meat grinder.

TEAPOTS. Have you a cracked teapot that won't hold tea? Slip a tumbler into it, and use it for a pretty flower container; or forget the tumbler, and use it as a plant holder.

TOOTHBRUSHES. Use it to clean keyboard keys and to get the dust and lint out of your sewing-machine parts. Use a soft one to scrub the raised pattern on your silverware. Use one in combination with suds and ammonia to give a sparkle to cut glass. It will also aid you in cleaning waffle irons and stove burners and in hard-to-get-at crevices. It will also be useful in getting the mud off the edges of boots and shoes.

VENETIAN-BLIND SLATS. Make an even small picket fence or individual slats can be easily converted into garden markers. They make good stirring sticks for dye or paint and can be held against an edge to give you a straight edge while painting or protect the surface that you are not painting.


