DOG LICENSES

Every owner or keeper of a dog 4 months old or older shall register the dog annually with the town clerk. At the time of registration the owner will receive a metal tag with the following information - name of the town, year of the issue of the license and its registered number. This tag is to be affixed to the dog's collar. Regardless of when the license is obtained, it shall be effective from May 1 of each year to April 30 of the subsequent year. To prevent the initiation of a late penalty of \$1.00 per month, please renew your dog license by April 30th. If you wish to license your dog by mail, please send a check payable to: TOWN OF ALEXANDRIA.

Dog Fees are as follows:

Puppy (Up to Seven Months) \$6.50 Spayed or Neutered \$6.50 Unaltered Male/Female \$9.00 Senior(Dog owned by Senior Citizen, 1st dog only) \$2.00 Group (5 dog minimum) \$20.00 Mail-In Fee (Per Dog) \$1.00

Vaccination Required - Before a license is issued the owner or keeper of the dog, must furnish verification that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies. If a valid rabies certificate is on file with the clerk, the owner shall not be required to produce such verification at the time of license.

Of the 7 arrests for the Month, 4 were Felonies 3 of which included the possession or sale of drugs.

Legal Question of the Month

Does NH Still issue Pistol Permits? Answer- Yes:

As long as you are legally allowed to possess a firearm, you can still obtain a pistol permit in the same manner as before, by filling out an application and dropping it off at the Police Department. The new law eliminates the <u>requirement</u> to have a permit in order to carry a concealed handgun within the State but if you plan on carrying a concealed handgun in any of the reciprocal states, you must have a physical permit issued from NH. You can also obtain a permit if you want to be able to pro-actively demonstrate to a Police Officer that you have passed a background check.

Emergency Management

Hope everyone is having a good spring so far (if you can call it that!) and that everyone is staying safe. Just wanted to take a moment to fill folks in on what is going on in the world of emergency planning and what we are currently working on.

First things first, our generator has been ordered and is awaiting installation! This is very exciting and as I mentioned once before, a project that I understand has long been awaited. You should see construction starting within the next month or so.

The other thing that I wanted to touch base with everyone on this month is our Hazard Mitigation Plan Update that we will be conducting. For those who aren't familiar, it is pretty much what it sounds like, a plan that discusses mitigation techniques and plans for potential hazards within our community. As one might imagine, most of what is discussed is in regards to the weather and how to care for our roads, etc. We have obtained grant monies in past



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years with this planning process as a key component in the mitigation of major issues that were ongoing in the town. The repair of Washburn Rd is one great example of this.

Recycling Committee 04/17



Recycling is contagious; You set the example, and others will follow

Money in our Pockets

We had a second consecutive bad month in February in spite of the \$180 saving realized from recycling glass. We currently are showing a deficit of \$294 for the first two months of the year. We did not have any revenue reported from scrap metal or aluminum cans in either January of February, and these two, items generally off-set any losses. There are some positive indications that the recyclable material markets are showing some improvement; for example "processing fees" are beginning to come down a bit, which means that recyclable materials are commanding higher prices. It's too soon to call this a swing in the general markets, as this increased demand relates only to specific categories of materials, but it is a good sign. We will continue to monitor this, and work with our vendors to obtain the most favorable arrangements.

The so called "single use" plastic bags have long been a recycling nightmare; they are generally not recyclable, although some grocery store chains and a few department stores do accept Polyethylene bags [#2 – HDPE & #4 – LDPE] that they collect and send to a special processing center in preparation for recycling into composite lumber; please check the recycling symbol on your plastic bags, and recycle them if possible. Other plastic bags [#'s 1, 3, 5, 6, and 7] made from other material are not generally recyclable, and end up in a landfill. In an attempt to control waste and resolve the plastic bag issue, many states are trying to limit the use of "single use" plastic bags either by imposing a fee on their use or banning their use outright. The advantage of an outright ban is that it will reduce and eventually eliminate the problem. A fee, on the other hand, is imposed to help defray the disposal expense. Generally, restrictions are initiated at the local level and expand to the state level, as it's often easier to fly under the opponent's radar and gain a foothold at the local level. The conflict over "single use" plastic bags has been going on for decades, and in spite of increasing efforts there are still only a handful of cities, and only one state, California, that have successfully legislated a ban on "single use" plastic bags; and in California, restaurants and department stores, both significant users of plastic bags, are exempt.

So why am I talking about this and why should you care? Simply because a usage fee on "single use" plastic bags, like bottle deposit fees, paint disposal fees, and mattress and furniture recycling fees, is part of a growing trend of methods municipalities and states are employing to help control the cost of waste disposal. Fortunately, Alexandria is not one of these municipalities; however, there are some items, which are not items you'd throw out on a daily basis such as appliances, tires, and major electronics, for which Alexandria currently does charge a disposal fee. We charge a fee only because we are charged a disposal fee by our vendor; however, the fee we charge is no more [and in many cases less] than the amount we are charged. A list of these fees is available at the transfer station, or on the town's website under the transfer station department. There are currently no plans to increase or expand these fees to additional items; however, if new or increased fees are imposed on us, the situation will be reviewed and may change. The transfer station is not a business, but rather a service to our community trying to ensure that we operate as efficiently as possible and expenses are shared fairly between all our residents – your understanding and support is appreciated.

Everyone Does Make a Difference

The recycling circle involves many steps and for recycling to be totally successful; each step must process the material safely and without harm to the workers or the environment. Recycling Environmental groups recently praised the Hewlett Packard Company for its announcement that they will henceforth reveal to the public where all of their electronic waste goes. The amount of electronic waste generated in this country both by manufactures and individuals has been growing steadily. Electronic waste poses some unique challenges as many items contain harmful materials [hazardous waste] and require special handling to ensure our safety. The call for "e-Trash Transparency" was one of the demands of the



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global toxic trade watchdog organization, Basel Action Network's (BAN) e-Trash Transparency Project. E-Trash Transparency simply means that companies, manufactures, and electronic waste processors/recyclers disclose where their electronic waste eventually ends up; confirming that it is being safely handled. BAN utilized GPS tracking devices placed within discarded electronic equipment to find out what really happens with our electronic waste. The project revealed in two reports, "Disconnect" and "Scam Recycling", that American consumers are often duped by recyclers or thrift shops like Goodwill Industries, when they claim environmentally safe recycling. BAN's investigation discovered that 40% of old printers and monitors were exported to countries like Pakistan and China where they are most often broken down in dangerous backyard operations exposing workers and the environment to dangerous substances such as mercury and lead.

Most of us try to dispose of our electronic waste in a responsible manner, and make a conscious effort to seek out manufacturers or recycling facilities that will recycle or dispose of this material properly. The public has a right to know where their old electronic waste, which is, in fact, hazardous waste, will end up. With the announcement last month, Hewlett Packard now joins Samsung and LG in being fully transparent in North America about their recycling destinations. However, most Information Technology equipment manufacturers, including Apple, Inc., still refuse to tell the public where their toxic e-waste, once collected from the public, will end up.

It's been 15 years since the general public has become aware that much of our electronic waste is being exported to developing countries; let's hope that Hewlett Packard's positive attitude and actions will inspire other companies and manufactures to follow their example and fully disclose where their e-waste ends up, so that we can be assured that our electronic waste is disposed of and recycled safely.

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Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Program:

Applications for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Form (DP-8) will be **available after May 1**, **2017**. The Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief program was designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain at-risk taxpayers.

An eligible applicant for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief is a person who is:

- Single with adjusted gross income equal to or less than \$20,000; or
- Married or head of NH household with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$40,000; and
- Owns a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax; and
- Has resided in that homestead on April 1 of the year for which the claim is made.

Applications for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief are accepted only during the statutory filing period - after May 1, but no later than June 30. The law allows 120 days for processing from the date of receipt of your completed application. For more information, visit http://www.revenue.nh.gov/assistance/low-moderate.htm.




