DOG LICENSES

Every owner or keeper of a dog 4 months old or older shall register the dog annually with the town clerk. At the time of registration the owner will receive a metal tag with the following information - name of the town, year of the issue of the license and its registered number. This tag is to be affixed to the dog's collar. Regardless of when the license is obtained, it shall be effective from May 1 of each year to April 30 of the subsequent year. To prevent the initiation of a late penalty of \$1.00 per month, please renew your dog license by April 30th. If you wish to license your dog by mail, please send a check payable to: TOWN OF ALEXANDRIA.



All Dog Licenses expire on April 30.

Vaccination Required - Before a license is issued the owner or keeper of the dog, must furnish verification that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies. If a valid rabies certificate is on file with the clerk, the owner shall not be required to produce such verification at the time of license.

On 02/22/17 Governor Sununu signed SB 12 into law. This eliminates the requirement to have a permit to carry a concealed handgun in NH. This does not allow a convicted felon, anyone convicted of Domestic Violence or anyone subject to a Domestic Violence restraining order, stalking order or certain bail conditions to possess any firearm. This basically means that if you are legally permitted to possess a handgun, you can now carry it concealed without first obtaining a permit.

The Alexandria Police Department will continue to issue permits to qualified persons if they would like one. If you plan to carry concealed in any of the states that Reciprocate with NH you will need an actual current and valid paper permit.

Legal Question of the Month

This month's legal question involves Probable Cause vs. Reasonable suspicion.

Many people believe that Police need Probable Cause to stop a car or to temporarily detain a person. This is technically incorrect. Probable cause is a higher level of proof that is required to make an arrest or a search. It basically means that there are a set of facts and circumstance that would cause a reasonable person to believe that a crime has been committed and this person more likely than not committed that crime.

In order for a Police Officer to stop a vehicle or temporarily detain a person we must have Reasonable and Articulable suspicious that a crime has been committed, is being committed or is about to be committed. This is a lower level of proof than Probable Cause and may or may not lead to an arrest or a search.

For example, seeing someone going from car to car in a parking lot looking into car windows is not probable cause to make an arrest but is certainly reasonable suspicion enough to stop and identify the person under the belief that a crime (theft) is possibly about to happen.

Recycling Committee 03/17



Recycling is contagious; You set the example, and others will follow

Money in our Pockets

We started off the new year on a down note with our recycling efforts actually costing us about \$125. This was due in large part because there was no scrap metal or glass revenue realized in January; these revenues should be picked up in February. For the past several years, we have been reporting our monthly and year to date savings in this section. Although savings are important, and I will continue to report them, we're going to expand this section to include other data of interest and importance in the hopes of providing our residents with a better understanding of waste management issues and how your tax dollars are being spent. For example, do you realize that for every ton of waste that goes into the compactor [solid waste] at the transfer station, it costs us \$100 to process? The compactor has a capacity of about 10 tons and each time it is hauled we pay \$200 in hauling charges, plus an additional \$78/ton processing fee; that's almost \$1000 every time the container is emptied, which is, on average, once a month. Obviously, the less frequently it has to be hauled, the better off we are. By recycling, we reduce the amount of material that goes into the compactor, which is a good thing; however, there is still a considerable amount of material that could be recycled finding its way into the compactor. Glass seems to be one of the biggest problems, and should be one that is easily corrected. For every ton of glass we keep out of the compactor, we have a net savings of about \$35. Now that might not seem lot a, but over time it adds up fast. Our glass recycling requirements are among the most liberal anywhere; we accept all glass including ceramics and even toilets and sinks (with hardware removed), and don't require bottles to be separated by color. It's relatively easy to designate a separate container for glass waste in your home, and the container for glass at the transfer station is conveniently located for easy access. In addition to saving us money, recycled glass is replacing natural resources for use in many areas such as a replacement for sand. Please make it a point to recycle your waste glass if you are not already doing so, and to those that are already faithfully recycling it; thank you.

Everyone Does Make a Difference

This is somewhat of an abbreviated newsletter this month, as our year-end report appearing in the Annual Town Report contains a lot of information. Some of you may have read in the 10 February 2017 Laconia Daily Sun that the town of Gilford has a warrant article to be voted on in March to approve \$950,000 in financing to upgrade their recycling center and the creation of a solid waste transfer facility. The annual gross savings are projected to be almost \$106,000. Guilford estimates that with loan repayments spread over 10 years plus the additional revenues generated, the net saving will be about \$40,000 annually even with the additional cost of two new part-time employees. Guilford is not alone in looking for new ways to control the increasing cost of handling waste removal; many other towns in New Hampshire and throughout New England are realizing that waste disposal is a significant portion of their annual budget and that increasing expenses require that new methods for handling waste be evaluated.

Alexandria's waste removal expenses are approximately 11% of the town's budget. As you know, we are a small town [about 1/5th the size of Gilford] and don't have the volume of waste that is sometimes required to make some options viable. Our recycling program has been successful since its inception, both in saving us money and helping to protect our natural resources. However, like other towns throughout the state, we need to continually review our options and pursue those that appear promising.
