DOG LICENSES



All Dog Licenses expired on April 30.

2019 Dog Licenses are NOW AVAILABLE.

Every owner or keeper of a dog 4 months old or older shall register the dog annually with the town clerk. At the time of registration, the owner will receive a metal tag with the following information - name of the town, year of the issue of the license and its registered number. This tag is to be affixed to the dog's collar. Regardless of when the license is obtained, it shall be effective from May 1 of each year to April 30 of the subsequent year. To prevent the initiation of a late penalty of \$1.00 per month, please renew your dog license by April 30th. If you wish to license your dog by mail, visit our website to download the form on the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's page at alexandrianh.com.

Dog Fees are as follows:

Puppy (Up to Seven Months)	\$6.50
Spayed or Neutered	\$6.50
Unaltered Male/Female	\$9.00
Senior(Dog owned by Senior Citizen, 1 st dog only)	\$2.00
Group (5 dog minimum)	\$20.00

Vaccination Required - Before a license is issued the owner or keeper of the dog, must furnish verification that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies. If a valid rabies certificate is on file with the clerk, the owner shall not be required to produce such verification at the time of license.

Payments for tax bills can now be made online via electronic check or credit card by visiting our website at alexandrianh.com and clicking on the "Property Taxes Review/Pay Online" button. Service Fee: We are using Invoice Cloud to process your actual payment. To cover the cost of the transaction, Invoice Cloud charges a service fee, the amount of which depends on the method by which you choose to pay and the costs to Invoice Cloud associated with processing that type of transaction. Electronic checks (ACH) are charged a flat fee of \$0.95 per transaction. Credit and debit cards are charged 2.95% of the amount being paid. For instance, if you are paying \$100 by credit card, the service fee will be \$2.95.

Making a Partial Payment? Partial payments can be made by adjusting the Payment Amount on the Check Out Page.

Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Program:

Applications for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Form (DP-8) will be **available after May 1, 2019**. The Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief program was designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain at-risk taxpayers.

An eligible applicant for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief is a person who is:

- Single with adjusted gross income equal to or less than \$20,000; or
- Married or head of NH household with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$40,000; and
- Owns a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax; and
- Has resided in that homestead on April 1 of the year for which the claim is made.

Applications for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief are accepted only during the statutory filing period - after May 1, but no later than June 30. The law allows 120 days for processing from the date of receipt of your completed application. For more information, visit <http://www.revenue.nh.gov/assistance/low-moderate.htm>.

Recycling is contagious; You set the example, and others will follow

Money in our Pockets

Net savings through March 2019 are \$1524. This includes our quarterly adjustment for glass, scrap metal/tin, and aluminum cans. There has been no revenue reported for copper in 2019. In an earlier communication, I indicated that as the result of modifications made to our program in October 2018, we were no longer recycling anything that did not result in positive revenue being generated. I have recently learned that the vendor processing our plastic has increased their processing fee to \$155/ton, which means that plastic is costing us more money to dispose of. However, market conditions being what they are these days, we are limited as to where we can dispose of our plastic waste; we can get a lower processing fee if we truck it to MA, but the hauling fee increases offset any saving there, and if we divert all plastics into the bulky waste, we increase the number of hauls for those containers, which has the net effect of offsetting any savings there. Based on the fact that the net cost to recycle plastic is approximately the same as not to recycle, the decision was made to accept the fact that it is going to cost us more to dispose of our plastic waste and continue to recycle those plastics for which there is still a market. By doing this we are continuing to keep a lot of plastic out of landfills and continue having a positive impact on the environment. We are maximizing our savings given our current facilities at the present location and we are handling the disposal of non-recyclable materials as efficiently as possible, given the current worldwide market conditions.

What's New at the Transfer Station

New hours of operation. We are happy to announce that the transfer station is now open from 8:00 to 4:00 on Monday. Tony and the staff hope that by extending our Monday hours it will help those individuals who find it difficult to get to the transfer station on Saturdays. Also, please remember to pick-up your 2019 transfer station passes at the office. Stickers are free, but you will need to provide proof of residence. Landlords are reminded that tenants may be asked to provide verification that they are renting a local residence before being allowed to dispose of trash. A simple note from the landlord stating the tenant's name, the address of the property, and the dates involved is all that is needed – thank you.

Although it has been six months since we altered our recycling program to comply with new restrictions imposed by the vendors processing our recyclable materials, there is still a lot of confusion, especially in the area of plastics, as to specifically what can and cannot be recycled. Because plastic is used for so many different products, and the chemical components are subdivided into seven categories, defining what is recyclable under the new restrictions can be confusing. We've tried to simplify the process by picturing typical item that qualify; however, there are always the exception. Beginning in May processing facilities will be imposing a surcharge of \$160/ton for contaminated loads. That generally means no more than 10% of a load can contain non-recyclable material. To simplify things, there are pictures of the plastics we accept for recycling on the signs in front of the plastics bin and in pamphlets available at the transfer station and the town municipal building – only those items pictured should be thrown into the bin, other materials are considered 'contamination' and will result in a surcharge being charged. Items **NOT** accepted include; Styrofoam, plastic bags, package wrapping [hard/soft], furniture, toys and play-sets, all pot-like containers [including seedling pots and trays, all containers used for flowering plants, shrubs, and small trees]. Many of the afore mentioned items may carry the recycling



symbol however, the chemical compound may not be acceptable by the vendors – if it's not pictured [even with a recyclable symbol on it], don't throw it in the bin, throw it in bulk waste.

Every Individual Has A Role

May is truly the beginning of spring here in New Hampshire; plants emerge from the ground to paint the landscape with vibrant colors and animals emerge from their nests, dens, and burrows often with newly born young to ensure the perpetuation of the species. What better time of the year to re-affirm our commitment to reuse materials that have fulfilled their original intent? This month I'm going to zero in on composting. People sometimes don't think of composting as a form of recycling; however, when you think about it, two of the objectives of recycling are to preserve our natural resources and extending the lives of our landfills by reducing the amount of waste discarded. Recently it was estimated that recyclable food waste and yard clippings from the lawns and garden make up about 30% of the material sent to landfills each year. The use of backyard composting can divert that material from landfills to help residents enjoy the benefits of fresh compost. Compost acts as a mulch enriching the soil, helping to retain moisture, and suppresses plant diseases and deter pests. Compost often reduces or eliminates the need for fertilizer.

Composting is easy and can be done indoors or outside depending on the size of your compost area. Instructions and tips for composting can be found on numerous websites including <https://www.epa.gov/recycle/composting-home#benefits>. You may ask, "won't compostable materials break down in a landfill just as easily; and therefore, won't adversely affect the landfill's capacity?" The answer is; compost is the enriched material left as the result of material being broken down by the natural process of decaying. Although no longer in its original state, compost does have volume albeit less than in its original state. Additionally, landfill management techniques often call for covering waste material with some type of 'top dressing' to contain the material, speed the decaying process, and enhance appearances – this 'top dressing' further reduces landfill capacity.

Composting is something everyone should consider doing. It will require that you pay attention as to what you place in the compost bin [pile], be sure to keep it moist by applying water periodically during dry periods, and turning the pile over with a pitchfork every so often to keep it aerated – all of these tips are readily available as part of the instructions you'll find on-line. Pre-made composting devices are available at home centers, garden and nursery facilities, and are often offered through local community groups such as garden clubs and conservation commissions. Hayneedle located in Laconia, NH has a wide selection you can order from their website; <https://www.hayneedle.com/>, search for compost bins.
