Transfer Station

Transfer Station hours changed on April 15th 2023 as follows:

Monday: 8 am to 4 pm Wednesday: 8 am to 6 pm Saturday: 8 am to 4 pm

Please arrive 15 minutes prior to posted closing time.

Final permitting has been obtained for the gravel pit to be developed on the southern part of the town-owned parcel, and excavation of the access road and pit began in late April. We are engaged in locating financing for the transfer station itself, as directed by the voters in March. This has been made more difficult by the rise in interest rates over the past months, but we are continuing with that effort. In mid-April we submitted an application for a Community Facilities Direct Loan/Grant, which is part of the USDA's Rural Development program. If it were to be successful, this could provide a partial grant (up to 15% of cost) for the project, and favorable loan terms for the remainder.

WELLINGTON STATE PARK PASSES

Wellington State Park Beach passes are not yet available. Each year, the Town applies for a special use permit from the State in order to provide the passes. We are waiting to hear back from the state on whether the special use permit has been approved for 2023. The special permit only grants the town the ability to sell passes to residents and/or taxpayers of the Town of Alexandria, their spouses and dependent children. The beach passes are nontransferable. Please keep in mind that the state recommends making reservations to the park otherwise access to the park is on a first come/first serve basis.

Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Program:

Applications for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Form (DP-8) should be **available after May 1**, **2023.** The Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief program was designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain at-risk taxpayers.

An eligible applicant for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief is a person who is:

- Single with adjusted gross income equal to or less than \$37,000; or
- Married or head of NH household with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$47,000; and
- Owns a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax; and
- Has resided in that homestead on April 1 of the year for which the claim is made.

Applications for the Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief are accepted only during the statutory filing period - after May 1, but no later than June 30. The law allows 120 days for processing from the date of receipt of your completed application. For more information, visit http://www.revenue.nh.gov/assistance/low-moderate.htm. NH Homeowners Assistance Fund

Are you behind in paying your mortgage, property charges, and/or utility payments? The Homeowner Assistance Fund Program provides assistance to eligible homeowners who have experienced a financial hardship during the COVID-19 public health crisis.

The NH Homeowner Assistance Fund program provides assistance to New Hampshire homeowners who have been affected in any way by an increase in expenses or a reduction in income as a result of the COVID-19 public health crisis. It is a federally funded homeowner assistance program through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery. It is administered by New Hampshire Housing. Visit homehelpnh.org or call 1-800-974-1377 ext. 1014 for information or assistance with the application, financial counseling, and other resources.

Eligible homeowners must:

- Have experienced a COVID related reduction in income or increase in household expense after January 21, 2020.
- Own and occupy the property as their primary residence.
- Have incomes of less than 125% of Area Median Income.

NH Homeowner Assistance Fund provides financial assistance for past-due bills only. No forward assistance is currently available.

Alexandria Community: Disaster Volunteerism
Do you have Medical Training? A Special Skill? ATV or Heavy Equipment?
Do you want to be able to help in the event of a local large-scale disaster or incident?

This year we have started working on an initiative to create a roster of community members of whom we can call on in the event of a large-scale incident or disaster. This would include any Alexandria residents who are willing to donate their time, medical assistance and/or resources, such as tools and/or heavy equipment, before, during, and after, a large-scale incident. Community Volunteer members can help by performing basic response activities, including checking in on their neighbors following an incident to make sure they are okay, assisting with search and rescue operations, and helping out with the emergency shelter, thus allowing professional responders to focus on more complex tasks. Community volunteers can also help by organizing, promoting, and participating in emergency preparedness events, activities, and projects. We all have a role to play in keeping our community safe. What role will you play? If interested in being added to this roster, sign up forms are available at the Town Hall.

CodeRED® is the FREE community notification system available to Alexandria residents that will send you alerts concerning time-sensitive and/or emergency information that may impact your area via phone calls, text messages, emails, and social media. AVFD encourages you to actively participate in emergency preparedness by remaining informed.

Uses: The CodeRed® system will be used to send critical communications, from evacuation notices to missing child alerts

Alexandria—Join the Newfound Land Conservation Partnership (NLCP) and NLCP committee member Kim Sharp for a guided hike in the Pitman Town Forest of Alexandria on Friday, May 12 at 9am. This guided event kicks off a summer series of hikes exploring conserved lands in the Newfound Watershed. The Pitman Town Forest was acquired by Alexandria in 1981 and contains stone walls, the remains of buildings, and a variety of forest wildlife. This easy to moderate, approximately 2 mile hike has a few step-over streams. Registration is required and space is limited. Register online at NewfoundLake.org/events or call 603-744-8689.

The NLCP is a collaboration among the Newfound Lake Region Association (NLRA); the Society for the Protection of NH Forests; the Lakes Region Conservation Trust; the Nature Conservancy; and volunteer representatives from the towns of Hebron, Groton, Bristol, Bridgewater, and Alexandria. Since 2009, the Partnership has worked to promote land conservation within the Newfound watershed through education and community outreach. Learn more about conservation in the Newfound Watershed and why land conservation is important at NewfoundLake.org/NLCP. Land conservation as an important part of NLRA's work to protect the high-quality waters of Newfound Lake and its watershed, maintaining a healthy and diverse ecosystem. Through water quality and invasive species monitoring, educational events such as guided hikes and nature activities, and land conservation efforts that protect open spaces and help manage stormwater pollution, NLRA approaches conservation at the watershed level.
