



WELLINGTON STATE PARK PASSES

Wellington State Park Beach passes are available in the Town Clerk's office. Each year, the Town applies for a special use permit from the State in order to provide the passes. Wellington State Park is owned and run by the State of New Hampshire. Each year, the Town applies for a special use permit from the State in order to provide the passes. The special permit only grants the town the ability to sell passes to residents and/or taxpayers of the Town of Alexandria, their spouses and dependent children. The beach passes are nontransferable. Please keep in mind that the state recommends making reservations to the park; otherwise access to the park is on a first come/first serve basis. Please plan ahead in the event the parking areas reach capacity. For more information or to make a reservation visit nhstateparks.org.

2026 Wellington State Park Beach Passes

Passes are in the Town Clerk's office and are available only to Alexandria residents and taxpayers.

Adults ages 12+:	\$6.00
Children age 6 to 11:	Passes are required for each child but at no charge
Children age 0 to 5:	Free, no passes needed
NH Residents over 65:	Free with a NH driver's license or ID – no pass required

Service Fee: We are using Invoice Cloud to process your actual payment. To cover the cost of the transaction, Invoice Cloud charges a service fee, the amount of which depends on the method by which you choose to pay and the costs to Invoice Cloud associated with processing that type of transaction. Electronic checks (ACH) are charged a flat fee of \$0.95 per transaction. Credit and debit cards are charged 2.95% of the amount being paid. For instance, if you are paying \$100 by credit card, the service fee will be \$2.95. **Making a Partial Payment?** Partial payments can be made by adjusting the Payment Amount on the Check Out Page.

Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Program:

Applications for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief Form (DP-8) should be **available after May 1**. The Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief program was designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain at-risk taxpayers.

An eligible applicant for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief is a person who is:

- Single with adjusted gross income equal to or less than \$37,000; or
- Married or head of NH household with adjusted gross income less than or equal to \$47,000; and
- Owns a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax; and
- Has resided in that homestead on April 1 of the year for which the claim is made.

Applications for the Low & Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief are accepted only during the statutory filing period - after May 1, but no later than June 30. The law allows 120 days for processing from the date of receipt of your completed application. Supervisors of the Checklist

NH State Law requires that the Supervisors of the Checklist verify the checklist every year. Any person on the checklist who has not voted in the past five years must re-register to remain on the checklist, unless the voter registered after the last state general election. The supervisors are sending notice letters to these voters at the address the voter provided when registering. The Supervisors of the Checklist for the Town of Alexandria will hold a session for re-registering voters who have not voted since April 1, 2021, accepting applications for new voter registration, accepting requests for the correction of the checklist, and/or change of political party affiliation on:

Public Relations Article: Property Value Update

For the tax year 2026, all property values will be updated to market value as of April 1, 2026. With the real estate market fluctuating over the past several years, many property owners will see values increase substantially; however, some may not increase by the same percentage as others, as it is heavily dependent on the sale properties, location, quality, size, condition, previous assessment, etc. Just because some values increase or decrease, DOES NOT NECESSARILY mean that your taxes will increase or decrease.

Taxes are based on the combined budgets for the Town, school, and county. The tax rate is determined by taking the total of those budgets divided by the overall value of the Town to arrive at a tax rate to "pay the bills". Unfortunately, there is no way to determine the impact of the update until after the values are finalized and until after the NH Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) calculates the total amount of money needed to "pay the bills". That process takes place in the fall, usually in October, with the Town's tax rate the result.

As part of this process, Avitar, assessing staff members over the years, have attempted to visit every property to verify that the physical data is accurate. This is especially important for the sale properties as they become the basis for the new values. Once we analyze the sales and develop preliminary values, there will be a field review of the entire town, which is just a drive-by parcel by parcel of every property to verify location, site characteristics, quality and so forth to be as consistent as possible. Please know the cycled inspection process has been done over the prior period and there was an attempt to measure and list every property during that time.

Once the preliminary process is complete notices with the new preliminary values will be mailed to every property owner. That notice will include information so that you can schedule a phone appointment to speak with an Avitar representative to discuss your assessment, should you have any questions. Also included in the notice are instructions to access the online database and review the information about your property and every other property in town, including the sale properties that were used to help establish the new values.

As part of this process, the DRA has some oversight responsibilities, which includes visiting a sampling of those properties to verify data accuracy and monitoring the hearing process. Once the update has been completed, Avitar will deliver to the Town a manual which describes the process in detail. The DRA will also review that manual for compliance with applicable state law.

LOCAL TURTLE ALERT!!

The Alexandria Conservation Commission wants to alert all of our residents about the importance of watching out for turtle activity during the next two months. Turtles are crossing roads all over the region, heading out to lay eggs or returning from laying. It takes a turtle approximately 15 years to mature before they can lay eggs, so turtles you see trying to cross the road have spent a long time to get there! They know where they are going...Please- if you see a turtle crossing the road:

1. STOP. Make sure you are safe and stop oncoming cars if possible.
2. If the turtle isn't at the road edge, allow it to safely cross on its own. Only pick it up if necessary -never by the tail- and put it down in the direction it was heading. If at a road edge, it could be nesting-just leave it! But please record the sighting (see below).
3. Take a picture, if possible.
4. Remember the date, approximate time of day, and location and write it down.
5. Send the info and photo asap to ACC chair Jenny Tuthill, (jentuthill@gmail.com or (603)744-6883). If you know it is one of our endangered species (Blandings, Wood, or Eastern Box turtle) you can also report to NH Nongame & Endangered Wildlife Program, RAARP@wildlife.nh.gov. We will report sightings from Alexandria to NHF&G.

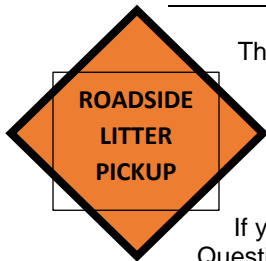

Local turtle observations are very important, as the ACC is attempting to undertake a general 2026 turtle survey for our town, and YOU are an important part of the study! This involves reporting by any of us who have seen a turtle or turtles, whether in your back yard, road, field, pond, stream, ANYWHERE. You may not know the species, that is ok. If you take a picture, we can identify it. If you don't have a camera, write down or remember details about the color of its head, and shell pattern or coloration if you can. There are endangered turtles (Blandings, Wood, and Box Turtles) we should not pick up or handle unless injured or helping to cross roads. And of course, never take a wild turtle as a pet.

If you come across an injured turtle, there is a turtle rescue clinic in New Hampshire. **NH Turtle Rescue**, Nottingham NH (603)417-4944. If you need help transporting an injured turtle, please contact Jenny Tuthill 03-744-6883.

Turtles face increasing threats from habitat loss, including wetland development and road fragmentation. As wetlands are filled or divided by roads and developments, turtles are forced into dangerous crossings that often result in fatalities. Protecting even a single turtle can make a meaningful difference in sustaining local populations. If you are interested in helping further, from May 3 through Oct. 3, volunteers of the New Hampshire Turtle Brigade help place roadside signs at key crossing locations. Thank you for your help. Alexandria is the only town in New Hampshire (we think) with a designated Turtle Preserve, and the ACC is currently doing a separate study of the turtle species specifically nesting there. We appreciate your support in protecting turtles who use the preserve. It is closed to people from April through November. No pets allowed at any time- they could dig up incubating eggs.



The Alexandria Conservation Commission is resuming the roadside litter pick-up we have done in past years. We will meet the first Saturday of each month at 10:00 am at the Alexandria Municipal Building. Depending upon the number of volunteers, we choose a road or several roads to clean up. Grippers and trash bags are provided but feel free to bring your own. We suggest you bring bug spray and gloves. We usually work for an hour to an hour and a half.

If you cannot join us but want to keep your neighborhood clean, we can provide you with trash bags. Questions? Contact Jenny Tuthill, 603-744-6883. If it is raining, we do not go out.

Our first pick-up day this year will be Saturday, May 2. Please join us- all are welcome!

When can I kindle my fire?

A category I fire may be kindled with a permit at any time whether raining or not. A category II and category III fire may only be kindled with a permit between the hours of 5:00 pm and 9:00 am unless it is actually raining.

What materials can be burned with a fire permit?

ONLY burning of untreated wood, untreated pallets, campfire wood, brush, or charcoal is allowed. Wood can be no greater than 5 inches in diameter. No domestic waste, treated wood, or composite materials may be burned. RSA-125N defines "combustible domestic waste" as, but not limited to, household trash, packaging materials, plastics, coated or laminated papers, rubber, painted or treated wood, coated or treated cardboard, oily rags, and animal, vegetable, and kitchen waste."

How close to a structure can I kindle my fire?

A category I fire must be at least 25 feet from structures and category II or greater fire must be at least 50 feet from structures.

When do Seasonal Permits Expire?

Seasonal permits are valid until December 31st of the year in which they are obtained. Do not obtain your seasonal permit before January 1st for the year you want. For example, if you obtain a Season Permit on December 28th, 2025, it will expire 3 days later on December 31, 2025.
